LIVESTOCK GENERAL RULES

Alcohol is strictly prohibited on the Maury County Fair Grounds. Offensive and or vulgar language will not be tolerated. Any exhibitor or workers using Alcohol and/or offensive and vulgar language will be asked to leave the show and their animals will be ineligible to participate in the show.

Admission to the Livestock Barns will require either a Livestock pass or a general admission ticket. Livestock Passes will be requested by name on the back of the entry form. Exhibitors will not require a pass. Exhibitor will be supplied three passes for family and workers. The pass is valid only for the day you show. Pass can only be used utilizing the livestock gate. This year no cars other than Fair Staff will be allowed pass the livestock gate. Trailers must utilize parking at the mule barns. We are growing however we will ensure every trailer has a place to park.

We should have no problem exceeding capacity; however, animals will be accepted according to the date the entries are postmarked. Submit your entries early. Stalls and pens are furnished for show stock only. WE ENCOURAGE YOU TO SUBMIT ENTIRY. THIS WILL SAVE YOU MONEY AND WILL HELP THE LIVESTOCK STAFF.

Junior Show exhibitors <u>must be</u> the owner of the animal listed on the registration paper.

The animal name, registration number, official required ID number, and birth date must be on the entry forms at time of entry for the animal to be eligible to show.

All exhibits must have an attendant with the animals until the entry books are completed. The attendant must have in his/her possession all necessary health certificates and the proper breed association registration papers if applicable.

BEDDING WILL BE FURNISHED BY THE FAIR. For the integrity of the fair and well-being of spectators, exhibitors, and livestock on exhibition, livestock should be presented in a healthy manner with adequately bedded pens/stalls.

An animal may be shown in only one breed show.

The Livestock Superintendent will assume full responsibility for establishing the class for each animal in the breeds that are broken down into classes. Numbers will be established after arriving at the fair.

Check-in Time will be 1 p.m. on the day of the show. Release times will be 9 p.m. on the day of the show. Unless there is a valid reason, tardiness beyond the official arrival and release schedule will not be tolerated. Should you have an emergency for arriving after the check in time for your animals. please contact the Livestock Superintendent or the Assistant Superintendent. Failure to adhere by this rule will result in forfeiture of <u>ALL</u> premiums. Early release time will be denied unless a valid emergency arises and must be approved by the Livestock Superintendent.

Any exhibitor washing animals in undesignated areas, dumping milk in undesignated areas, and blocking passage way gates in the barns will forfeit <u>ALL</u> premiums.

The Maury County Fair or, directors, or volunteers will not be responsible for any article of any nature or animal exhibited for any loss, damage, or accident that may occur. Each exhibitor shall be responsible for any injury that may occur to any person whomsoever, by any animal exhibited or arises from the negligence of the person in charge of such animal.

To have a breed show, the following qualifications must be met each year: Beef and Dairy Cattle, Sheep, and Goat breeds must have a minimum of two exhibitors and 10 animals. If the quality of exhibits falls below the standard of creditable exhibitors, that show will be eliminated the following year, at the discretion of the Maury County Fair Board.

All trailers and trucks will be parked in the designated parking area. ** A LOCK IS RECOMMENDED FOR ALL TRAILERS**.

Dogs should NOT be brought to the fair, however, if there is a reason for an exhibitor to have a dog at the show the dog <u>MUST</u> be on a leash and under control (no barking or disrupting any animal or person) <u>Under no circumstance will a dog be allowed outside the livestock barn</u> as no animals are allowed in any other part of the fairgrounds.

PROTESTS: All protests will be determined by the Livestock Executive Committee, and must be made in writing signed and filed with the Livestock Superintendent, within 24 hours after the show. This protest must be accompanied by an affidavit setting forth grounds for protesting and posting of a \$100.00 non-refundable cash bond. Official Photographer: An official photographer will be designated for the Maury County Fair. Anyone wishing to engage the services of this photographer should contact the Livestock Superintendent.

Official Veterinarian: The Maury County Veterinary Hospital will serve as the official veterinarian for the Maury County Fair. A veterinarian will be available for services and emergencies at a charge to the owner for services rendered. Should one be needed please contact Livestock Superintendent.

If it is determined before, during, or after a show that an exhibitor has violated a General or Health rule, show management has the right to subject the exhibitor to the following disciplinary provisions:

Forfeiture or return of awards. prizes. premiums or proceeds

A written letter of reprimand to the owner, exhibitor, fitter, and/or disqualifications that may include any or all shows and divisions at the Maury County Fair and may be for any number of years

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS (IAFE)

NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity in the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the 'IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics,' fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels.

All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their line example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1) All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2) Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3) Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4) Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of violative drug residues. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event.

If the laboratory report on the analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medications, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample of urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise.

At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.

5) Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alterits natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.

- 6) The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7) Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8) No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9) The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10) The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including Fairs and Expositions and any special notices to members.
- 11) The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

CHAPTER 0080-02-03 RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING MOVEMENT AND HANDLING OF LIVESTOCK AT FAIRS AND EXHIBITIONS

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0080-02-03-.01 GENERAL.

- (1) Livestock entering fairs and exhibitions shall comply with the following, as applicable:
- (a) Livestock entering fairs and exhibitions from within Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection with official, permanent, individual identification or sufficient description to identify each animal. Certificates for this purpose shall be valid for ninety (90) days from the date of inspection for in-state animals.
- (b) Imported livestock entering fairs and exhibitions, including poultry, shall be subject to the Tennessee import requirements found in Chapter 0080-02-01. Official certificates of veterinary inspection for imported animals are valid for thirty (30) days from date of issuance.
- (2) All stalls, pens, chutes, etc., located on the grounds of fairs and exhibitions shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a disinfectant approved by USDA APHIS between each scheduled exhibition.
- (3) Animals showing clinical signs of an infectious or communicable disease shall not be allowed to enter or remain on the premises of fairs and exhibitions. It shall be the responsibility of the manager of such fairs and exhibitions to ensure that such animals are promptly removed from the premises.
- (4) Fair association and exhibition management shall be responsible for ensuring that each animal entered is accompanied by the documentation required by this chapter.

0080-02-03-.03 CATTLE.

(1) Cattle entering fairs and exhibitions from within Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official certificate of veterinary inspection with official, permanent, individual identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.

(1) All sheep entering fairs and exhibitions, including wethers, shall have an official certificate of veterinary inspection as provided in Rule 0080-02-03-.01 (1), and shall be officially, permanently identified by a method set forth in 9 C.F.R. 79.1-79.4.

(1) All goats entering fairs and exhibitions, including wethers, shall have an official certificate of veterinary inspection as provided in Rule 0080-02-03-.01 (1), and shall be officially, permanently identified by a method set forth in 9 C.F.R. 79.1-79.4.

0080-02-03-.11 ENFORCEMENT.

- (1) Fair association and exhibition management shall inform exhibitors of the rules of this chapter, and shall notify the state veterinarian or his agent of any violation. Exhibitors shall present evidence of compliance with this chapter to the state veterinarian or his agent upon request.
- (2) These rules and regulations in no way restrict fairs and exhibitions from establishing additional or more stringent health requirements.
- (3) Persons involved with the movement and handling of domestic animals, including poultry, at fairs and exhibitions shall submit records for inspection and copies of documents immediately upon the request of the commissioner or his agent.
 - (4) Fair association and exhibition management shall not permit the exhibition, sale, or offering for sale of animals not accompanied by the documentation required by this chapter.
- (5) It is a violation of this chapter to knowingly exhibit, sell, or offer for sale any animal with a transmissible disease.

TENNESSEE DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE DIVISION OF CONSUMER & INDUSTRY SERVICES ANIMAL HEALTH

SUMMARY: LIVESTOCK HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR FAIRS AND EXHIBITIONS

I GENERAL:

- A. All stalls, pens, chutes, etc. located on the grounds of fairs and exhibitions shall be thoroughly cleaned and disinfected with a disinfectant approved by USDA, APHIS between each scheduled fair or exhibition.
- B. All livestock (except poultry and equine) which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification. Certificates for this purpose shall be valid for ninety (90) days from date of issue. (Tennessee livestock only out-of-state certificates are valid for thirty (30) days from the date of issue)
- C. No animal showing clinical signs of infectious or communicable disease shall be allowed to enter or remain on premises of fairs or exhibitions. It shall be the responsibility of the manager of each event to assure prompt removal of such animals.
- II LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING WITHIN THE STATE OF TENNESSEE [Certificates of Veterinary Inspection Valid for a Period of Ninety (90) Days]
 - A. SWINE: All swine which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent identification or sufficient description to identify each animal.
 - B. CATTLE: All cattle which enter fairs and exhibitions shall be accompanied by an official veterinary health certificate with individual permanent, official identification.

C. POULTRY:

- (1) Sponsors of poultry shows or exhibitions shall notify the Tennessee Department of Agriculture at least **thirty (30) days prior to show or exhibition**.
- (2) Poultry found not to be in apparent good health shall be removed immediately from any show or exhibition.
- D. HORSES & OTHER EQUIDAE: Horses and other Equidae six (6) months of age and older must have a negative Equine Infectious Anemia test within the preceding twelve (12) months.

E. SHEEP

- (1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) All sheep that move within the state, with the exception of wethers under the age of 18 months that are produced for slaughter only, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

F. GOATS

- (1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- G. CAMELIDS: Camelids must have an official veterinary health certificate as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1).
- H. CAPTIVE CERVIDAE: Captive Cervidae must have an official veterinary health certificate as provided in Rule 0080-2-3-.01 (1)
- III LIVESTOCK AND POULTRY ORIGINATING OUTSIDE THE STATE OF TENNESSEE Livestock and Poultry entering fairs and exhibitions from areas outside the State of Tennessee shall be subject to current Tennessee import requirements. Please contact the state veterinarian's office regarding questions or recent changes to these rules. These interstate requirements are summarized as follows:
 - A. ALL SPECIES (except poultry): Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection valid for thirty (30) days and individual permanent official identification, except for equine. Equine must have sufficient description to identify the animal.
 - B. CATTLE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:
 - (1) Tuberculosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of tuberculosis.
 - (2) Brucellosis: No requirements except for cattle originating from regions not considered free of brucellosis. Test eligible cattle Intact male or female cattle eighteen (18) months or older. (Vaccinates and non-vaccinates)
 - D. SWINE: No testing requirements for swine unless originating from a region not considered free of Brucellosis and Pseudorabies.
 - E. HORSES AND OTHER EQUINES: Animals six (6) months of age or older negative equine infectious anemia (Swamp Fever) test within twelve (12) months.
 - F. POULTRY: Originate directly from a Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Flock and an H5/H7 Avian Influenza Clean Flock, or be accompanied by evidence of a negative Pullorum-Typhoid test within ninety (90) days and a negative Avian Influenza test within twenty-one (21) days.

G. SHEEP:

- (1) All sheep imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) All sheep that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.

H. GOATS

- (1) Goats imported into or through Tennessee shall be accompanied by an official health certificate and be in compliance with 0080-2-1-.02, and Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (2) Goats imported into Tennessee for immediate slaughter to an approved slaughter establishment or to an approved livestock market for sale to a slaughter establishment shall only be required to have a transportation document and be in compliance with Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
- (3) All registered breeding goats, goats that have been commingled with sheep, goats for exhibition and dairy goats that move within the state, including for change of ownership, shows, fairs, expositions or slaughter shall be permanently, individually identified by a method approved in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79.1 through 79.4.
 - I. CAMELIDAE: Same requirements as for cattle.
 - J. CERVIDAE: Certificate of Veterinary Inspection and additional requirements as follows:
- (1) Brucellosis: Same requirements as for cattle.
- (2) Tuberculosis: (a) All cervidae shall originate in herds which have had a negative herd test for tuberculosis within twelve (12) months with a USDA approved single cervical test and individual imported animals shall be negative to the single cervical test within thirty (30) days of entry; or (b) Animals not originating in tested herds as described above must test negative to two (2) single cervical tests at least ninety (90) days apart, the second test conducted not more than thirty (30) days prior to entry.

NOTE: (Contact an accredited veterinarian for further details of import rules).

IV Fair association or exhibition or management shall inform exhibitors of the rules of this chapter, and shall notify the State Veterinarian or his agent of any violations. Exhibitors shall present evidence of compliance with this chapter to the State Veterinarian or his agent upon request.

These rules constitute a minimum legal standard and in no way restrict the right of fair and exhibition managers to establish additional or more stringent requirements.
